The infrastructure of these Welfare hospitals is adequately equipped with essential medical facilities. offer a wide array of medical services, basic healthcare, including general consultations and primary care addressing prevalent diseases in the region, like seasonal Diseases, HIV, tuberculosis, Malnutrition etc.

The hospitals typically employ a mix of medical professionals, including doctors, nurses, and support staff. Specialists in various fields like gynecology, pediatrics, orthopedics, are available. These hospitals serve as a lifeline for many who cannot afford expensive medical treatments. Community-oriented approaches make them an integral part of the healthcare landscape in the region.

Community Engagement and Outreach: A significant aspect of Tigra and Gando welfare hospital is their community engagement initiatives. They often conduct health camps, awareness programs, and health education sessions to promote preventive healthcare practices and early disease detection. 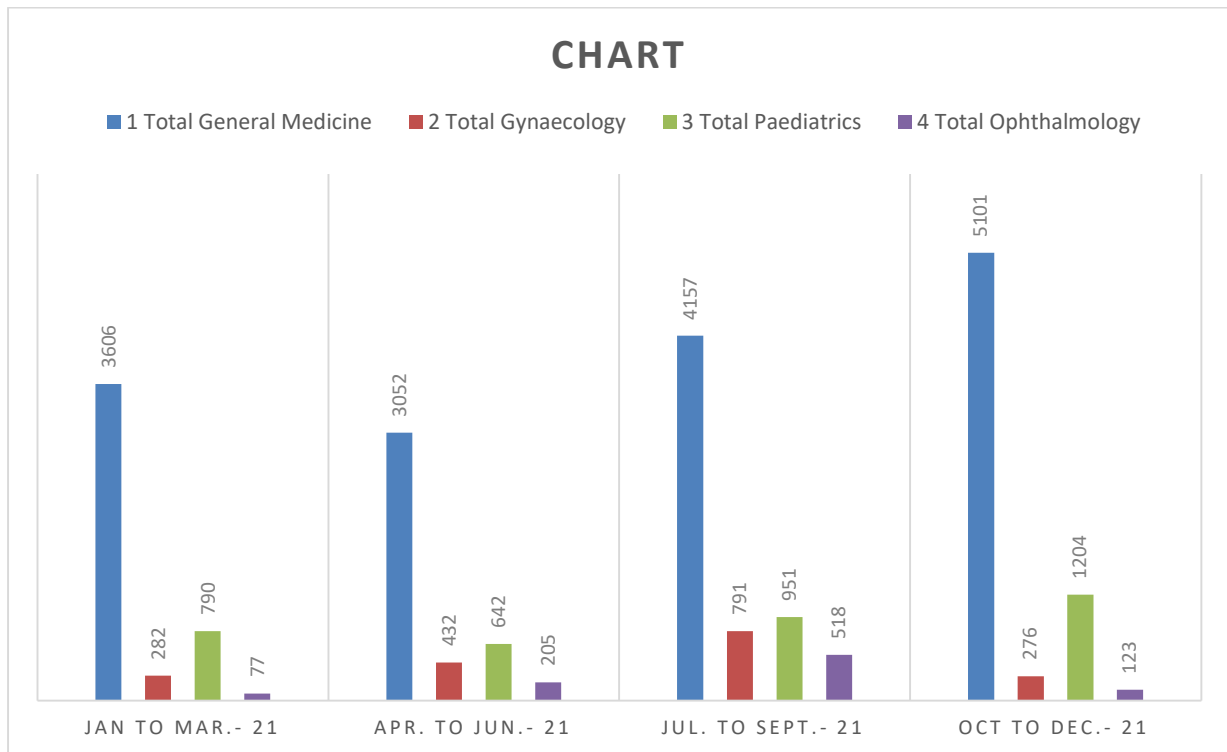

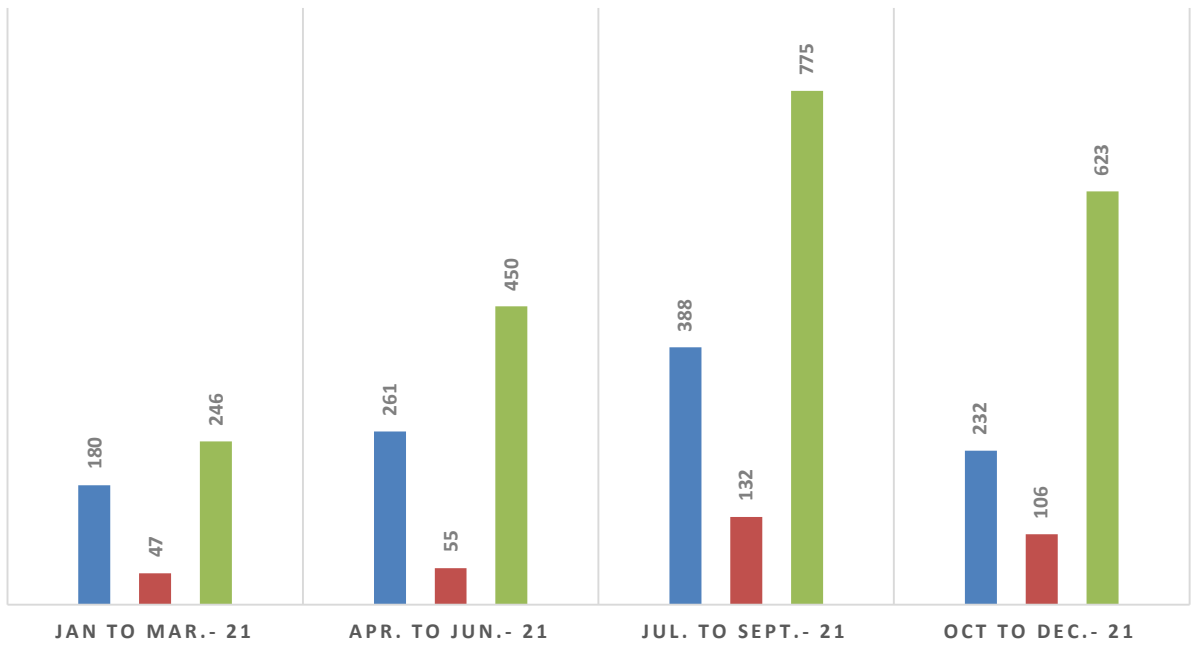
